### A bit of an introduction to some of the invited speakers and their topics -

**Professor Ruth Wallace**, Director of the Northern Futures CRN and the Northern Institute at Charles Darwin University, Australia – What is Australia's Northern Development Agenda and what does it mean for northern communities? **Dr Gertrude ('Gertie') Eilmsteiner-Saxinger** is with Vienna University, but has been working for the last several years with communities in the north of Russia and Canada. Gertie is interested in patterns of work in the north (particularly in the mining and resources sector) and how communities adapt to having locals and visitors who work unusual patterns (fly-in/ fly-out, shift work etc). Gertie has some great stories about how communities can benefit from temporary workforces and workers who come and go.



**Dr Sharon Harwood** is a Certified Practicing Planner and a Corporate Member of the Planning Institute of Australia and continues to practice as a social and urban planner. Sharon currently lectures in Environmental and Regional Planning, Planning for Sustainable Communities and is the course co-ordinator for the Graduate Certificate in Planning for Indigenous Communities. Sharon's planning experience in remote areas coupled with her research projects in remote communities has led her to believe that urban planning theory and practice is unsuitable for application in non-urban settings. Sharon's primary research interest is now centered on how remote communities plan for change and how this in turn may inform planning theory and improve planning practices undertaken in remote locales.
